Message from Our Minister Rev. Pam Philips

What does it mean to be a people of **liberation**? What a question to ask of a people who have been told to practice physical distancing, sticking close to home and far away from others when they've ventured out to the grocery store or other public places. And yet, that's the theme we're invited to consider in the month of April.

As I write, the sun is shining, the wind is blowing, the trees are blossoming, the pollen is flying. It's easy to think of spring as a time of liberation—from the cold, gray, dreary days of winter. But this spring, we are facing a new way of being in the world—different from any that we have ever known.



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One way of thinking about it is that we've been freed from our routines—

whether that means going to an office, classroom, café, gym, or other meeting place. Instead, we're establishing new routines—working from home, not working at all, connecting with others on the internet. Some of us have way more time on our hands, while others are working more hours than ever. Few people's lives have been unchanged. If letting go is a form of liberation, then we've all been liberated.

But this has also been a time of captivity. We're held captive by the news—anxious to hear about how many people have contracted the virus in faraway places, but even more so closer to home, and to hear the most recent recommendations from our government officials and the scientists. We want to know how bad it will get and how soon it will affect us more directly. And when it will end. We are held captive by fear.

What does it mean to be a people of liberation? In these times, perhaps the greatest key to our liberation is not looking to the past or the future—reminders of what we miss or forecasts of what we fear—but staying present to now. At this moment, we are ok. The sun is shining, the wind is blowing the trees are blossoming, the pollen is flying. At this moment, we can take a walk, read a book, meditate, or simply take a breath. At this moment, we can reach out to one another—making a phone call, writing an email, joining one of the many online gatherings listed in the newsletter and on our calendar. At this moment, while we may be physically separated from other people, we need not be alone.

We are not alone. All our lives have been and will continue to be affected by this virus—a stark reminder of the interdependent web of which we are a part. But also an urgent reminder that we can cultivate and be nurtured by our connections. In the month ahead, let us practice mutual liberation, helping each other to stay present to the now by maintaining and expanding our compassionate community. Reach out to help, reach out to ask for help, stay connected.

Special Messages from the Board: Conveying Both the Challenges & Spirit of These Times

We all know what is going on around the world. While we are all staying in isolation reading the news with emotions running high, our family is also preparing to bring a new life into the world. If everything goes as planned, our daughter will be born on March 27. This is a terrifying time to be having a baby, I admit. The panic and sheer emotion level at the hospital on our weekly trips are extraordinary. Our family will not be allowed at the hospital for support. William, almost 4, will not get to meet his sister for several days – a moment he has eagerly been awaiting for months. This is a stark difference from the journey we



envisioned. We have been on such a long road to get to this point, now even in these tumultuous times, one of the best moments of my life is about to happen. I believe in making meaning even in hard times, and my take-away is this - even in chaos, beauty is still being born. (Note: Baby Daphne was born on March 27 as planned, and all are home and doing great.)

Keeping this in mind, I have been so impressed with Rev. Pam in her handling of the situation. The decision to close down UUC for a month was a very tough one for the Board. I truly believe that if we, as a Board, had walked into our meeting with a guiding voice other than Pam's, we might not have taken the steps we did as quickly as we did. She even provided us with several options for moving forward. Even with Rev. Pam's undeniable sadness of closing the church doors, she met this challenge with enthusiasm to find solutions. We all know she would rather be in front of us on Sundays, but the virtual services are still allowing us all to connect – including some people that may not have been able to otherwise. In our home, being able to tune in weekly means the world to my wife and me as we hold on to anything close to normal.

If you are having trouble seeing any light in this dark situation, I encourage you to look to our congregation, reach out, and see the community around you. Pam and the rest of the staff have banded together to continue as many congregational functions as possible through Zoom and other paths. UUC is continuing to be a place to look to for stability in the midst of challenges. I could not be prouder of our congregation. I believe that if we let this movement inside our church grow, we will truly be stronger together, more prepared to reach and connect with people in our community and beyond with a message of compassionate love, service, and undeniable inter-connectedness.

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UUC's 2020-2021 Stewardship Campaign Update



2020: Vision & Visibility

On March 1, our pledge drive started off with a bang—with 46 pledges for a total of \$136,957 (nearly 40% of the way toward our goal!)—thanks to all those who participated in the early bird effort!

And despite our world being turned upside-down, we find ourselves at the "end" of our annual stewardship campaign but only 76% of the way toward our goal of \$357,000, with 126 out of an expected 165 pledge units having made their commitment for 2020-21.

Given the events of the past month in our own lives and the life of our nation and world, we find ourselves in a glass half-full/half-empty situation. Look at how much has been pledged (\$271,800) despite the economic turmoil and financial uncertainty we've experienced! And look at how much farther we want to go.

This is indeed an unprecedented and scary time in our lives. And it's perhaps the most difficult time to hold a stewardship campaign and plan for our congregation's future. In the next month, the Finance Committee and the Board will have to make some hard decisions about where and how we can trim our budget. Most of us will be facing a similar situation at some point in our own lives, and UUC is no different. We urge you to think of the value of this congregation, particularly in these difficult times – for yourself and for others.

To those of you who have pledged: Thank you! For those who haven't, we understand your reluctance. **And** we invite you to go ahead and make a pledge, even if it is a smaller commitment than you've made in years past. No amount is too small. (See below for ways to pledge.) If the economy and your personal financial situation improves in the year ahead, you can always increase your giving. And if things turn out even worse than you expect, you can let us know that, too.

All of our pledges, no matter their size, are a sign of our commitment and faith in this spiritual community and its ability to thrive, even in these most difficult times.

We are grateful for them all.

UUA General Assembly Is Coming!

The <u>2020 Unitarian Universalist General Assembly</u> will be held **June 24-28** in Providence, RI*. This year's theme is **Rooted, Inspired & Ready!** Beginning with a banner parade through the Convention Center, thousands of UUs from across the country will participate in 5 exciting



days of workshops, plenary sessions, worship services, music, and more. They will witness the presentations, sermons, experiences, thoughts, and wisdom of our denomination's best and brightest. Parallel to and integrated with the adult proceedings is an exciting Youth Program.

UUC is authorized to send up to 5 delegates (delegates' registration fees are reimbursed by UUC). Note that delegates can attend in person or online. Interested in being a UUC delegate? Contact <u>Steve</u> <u>Keighton</u>. The Board will vote **April 9** to choose our delegates. There is no limit to the number of non-delegate attendees that we can send.

* Due to the challenge of Coronavirus, the UUA is discerning how General Assembly will be shaped to meet the changes and challenges but assure us that GA *will take place* from June 24–28 in one form or another.

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The virtual Sunday services have been very well attended. Rev. Pam's use of Zoom has been very effective in bringing some semblance of normalcy to our Sunday mornings. It is particularly nice to be able to interact with a small group through the use of Zoom's breakout rooms. While not the same as being there, this method of "greeting" one another provides a welcome bit of social contact. If you have not attended a virtual service yet, please do give it a try. Zoom is really quite easy to set up and use.

The Board will be using Zoom to hold our monthly meeting virtually on **April 9**. In addition to the logistical challenges, the Board is also facing significant administrative challenges during this time. First, we will need to discuss implications of a continued building closure in light of the Governor's recent stayat-home order. We are also facing significant financial challenges. The coronavirus crisis has significantly slowed the response to our stewardship campaign. We will need to make decisions on our next fiscal year's budget in the next few weeks, and we are still very far from the pledge amount that will be necessary. If you have not made your pledge yet, please consider doing so now.

The number of pledge payments coming in has also slowed which is putting a strain on our current cash flow, as our bills and staff still need to be paid. We realize that many of us are facing financial pressures of our own, but if not coming to Sunday services has meant you are not bringing in a pledge check, please consider mailing one in. Our congregation runs on your support, and we need that now more than ever.

Despite all the pressures that the coronavirus has brought, Mother Nature continues her cycle of the seasons. The arrival of spring is bringing all sorts of growing things to life. It is a joy to hear all the birds singing in the morning from the budding trees and to see the spring flowers blooming. As we wait for this health crisis to pass, it is comforting to see what a wonderful world we still have. I can't wait to get outside!

E-giving Via Text & Mobile App

We are in the process of setting up the capability for all to donate to UUC using a **Vanco texting** service or their mobile app called Give Plus+.

This will enable us to hold our Sunday 1/2 plate donations during a virtual service. It will also allow for donations during Sunday services for those who don't bring checks to the service or simply want to use these methods to pay pledges or donate to other areas such as YRUU, the Community Assistance Fund, etc., and even to pay for auction purchases. It will require entering a credit card or bank account info one time.

Staff will continue to be paid as they are working from home.
- The Board was glad to learn that Lisa Evanylo, Administrator, will not be retiring as planned at the end of June. The budget (salary and retirement) will be adjusted accordingly.
- The Board approved the purchase of a blood pressure cuff but will hold off on purchase of a defibrillator at this time.

UUC Is in Touch with the BEES

Wow! It takes 2 beehives, or 60,000 bees, to pollinate 1 acre of an orchard. And, 1/3 of the world's food crops, including the superfoods we love, depend on honeybees and other pollinators (information from EARTHJUSTICE). Our Grounds' Ministry, with help from beekeeper, Richard Reid, is playing a part in promoting healthy bees. Richard is loaning 3 of his hives to UUC, and George Lally and Bob Stimson are putting the finishing touches on construction of a fence to protect the hives. We anticipate the 3 hives to arrive by mid-April.

Conscious efforts have been in progress to increase the footage of natural areas on our grounds to promote the growth of flowering weeds for the bees. Additionally, flowering trees have recently been added to our grounds, and these will augment the enlarged pollinator garden and the existing flowering plants. Declines in honeybee populations have been linked to the use of systemic insecticides. Despite the negative evidence, the EPA has approved the use of harmful pesticides. Note: We do not use any systemic pesticides on UUC's property.





Your Life, Your Legacy, and the UUC Endowment Funds by Bill Baker



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We are living in uncertain times, but two things remain certain death and taxes. There are many in our congregation who have fewer years to live than they have already lived, myself included. You have likely supported UUC throughout your UU lifetime, but now is the time to consider your legacy—the values you want to support and be identified with after your death. A wonderful way to formalize your legacy is to include UUC in your estate plan by giving your estate, or a portion of it, to UUC via contributing to one or more of our UUC Endowment Funds. You can specify whether you would like your gift to go to the General Endowment Fund or to a Restricted Endowment Fund. Should you decide to give to the Restricted Endowment Fund, you can specify the ministry where you want your gift to go, e.g. music, LFD, grounds, social justice, etc. Visit the Endowment Committee webpage for specific forms, pamphlets, and other important information.

The Endowment Funds were established in 2017 with Board and congregational approval. The monies are invested in the <u>Unitarian Universalist Common Endowment Fund</u> (UUCEF). The key characteristics of the UUCEF are:

- Long-term investment fund
- Diversified portfolio
- Managed by specialist profession investment managers
- Managed to reflect UU values while achieving financial goals— "Risk, Return, Justice"

The current value of the General Endowment Fund is \$23,071, and a just-received generous contribution will be deposited April 1.

Those most likely to consider giving to the UUC Endowment Funds are in the later years of life who 1) are thinking about their life in the UUC community and what it has meant to them, 2) who are making estate plans and, 3) who want to leave a lasting legacy to the UUC community that they love.

One of my favorite things about being a part of our beloved UU community is the opportunity to serve as a worship associate. It didn't start out that way. I thought, as the idea of standing in front of the congregation grew into a buzzing ball of anxiety in my stomach. But it only took one worship meeting for me to become hooked. Now, I look forward to our monthly meetings in eager anticipation of the joy of fellowship and deepened sense of meaning that it brings to my life. Here are just a few of the reasons why I find it such a fulfilling experience:

The Worship Associates' Program is inclusive. Rev. Pam has made a genuine commitment to the idea of "shared ministry" and clearly demonstrates it by carefully listening to the contributions of her Worship Associates and the other members of the Worship Team. The term "worship weaving" is a very apt description of the way she solicits input from everyone in the room and allows it to become a part of the worship services that she creates. Her capacity to include the many diverse voices within our community is a celebration of our mutual striving to achieve our mission, vision, and values together.

Being a Worship Associate has become a central component of my reflective practice. Considering the monthly worship themes does not stop at the end of the monthly worship meetings, but rather they continue on as ongoing internal dialogues that I engage in for weeks to come, and serve as lenses that deepen my understanding of the other events in my life.

Being a Worship Associate fosters the cultivation of reverence, compassion, and kindness. The first time that I climbed the steps of the chancel and approached the microphone of the dais, it nearly took my breath away. Looking out at your combined luminosity was one of the most beautiful, miraculous things I had ever seen, and I suddenly realized that the task at hand was much larger than me. I also recognized that this was what growth feels like, so I persevered. I pushed past my self-doubt, my judgements, and my ego and worked to become a person that was worthy of the shimmering faces before me. I am deeply grateful for the opportunity to be a Worship Associate.

April 5: Rev. Pam Philips, *Liberated from the Bonds of Space*. April 19: Rev. Pam Philips, *Liberation from Expectations.* Considering worship themes three weeks in advance seems an exercise in futility. So much has changed so quickly over the past month. This week, we'll practice being liberated from expectations and trust in our worship team to create a vibrant and compelling service, sure to engage and surprise.

April 26: Rev. Jon Coffee, **Bigger Boat Theology.** We've been sailing all our lives now, never a time like this have we known. In the era of Covid-19, the task of social justice and mercy require creatively re-imagining the work before us. "We're gonna need a bigger boat."
