Message from Our Minister

Yet with the bustle of travel and the need to plan for children who are out of school, summertime can feel anything but easy.

As we look ahead to the month of July, I encourage us all to appreciate those moments of ease when we are blessed to have them, but also to seek them out when we find that our lives are getting too busy and frenetic. I'll also be taking advantage of my time off by attending Sunday services. 
Two Mental Health Support Groups at UUC


Karen Hager, Director of Lifespan Faith Development, will be taking time off with dates TBD. Watch for more info.


Summer RE on Sundays at 10 AM-Grades K-5

About Our Paraments



Those decorative pieces one sees on Sundays on the front of the podium and candle table are called "paraments" (or paramentum to be precise). Each has been lovingly sewn by a congregant and given as a gift to the congregation to brighten and enhance our sanctuary.

Some months ago, the idea was hatched to form a group of sewers, quilters and artists to design and sew some new sets. Assembling the parts of a quilt is called "piecing", and so we have named ourselves "The Piecemakers". The first set is nearly complete and will be presented in the early fall.

Our next project will honor our children and will include special small pieces of cloth from our children's outgrown wardrobes or another source which has significance to the donor. It can be any kind of fabric with the ideal size being about 5" X 8". Collection boxes are available at UUC. We will have a table in Elarth Hall after several services with a sample of what the quilt block will look like.

June Board Mtg. Highlights

- During the member forum, Susan Baker spoke out in favor or equal pay for the pianist and choir director and gave an update on the Garden Tour at UUC on **July 6**. Isabel Berney spoke in favor of the installation of a permanent screen in the sanctuary.
- ◆ The Board discussed staff salary issues, gift donations to UUC, and purchase of a screen for the sanctuary.
- ◆ The budget will be revisited when the yearend fiscal numbers are in, likely in August.
- Nancy Norton gave a review of the Board's input about our strategy for long range planning/strategic planning. A discussion followed. This issue will be discussed further in July.
- ◆ The Board discussed options for the Board retreat, most likely to be held in August.

The next Board meeting will be held on Wednesday, **July 11 at 5:30 PM** and will include our newly elected Board members. The <u>minutes</u> <u>and reports</u> of meetings for the past two calendar years are available.

UUC Mortgage Information

- \$ In 2009 the Congregation took out a 30-year mortgage for \$980,000 and member loans for \$235,000 in order to pay the construction costs of expanding our building. We have been working now for 10 years to pay down these debt obligations. Our mortgage is now down to \$770,000, and member loans are now down to \$18,000.
- \$\$ Our mortgage payment is a large item in our annual budget. We currently are paying \$4,821.62 per month (or \$57,859.44 per year) towards the mortgage. Each time we pay, a larger proportion of our payment goes towards paying back principle, and a smaller proportion goes towards paying interest.
- \$\$\$ Over the next 20 years it is projected that we will pay an additional \$1,152,000 of which \$770,000 will be for principle and \$382,000 will be for interest.
- \$\$\$\$ It is possible to pay less money in interest and to pay off the mortgage sooner by making early extra payments. For example, paying an extra 2 months' worth of payments early would save \$9,700 in projected interest payments and shorten the length of the mortgage by 4½ months! Even a small donation designated to paying down the mortgage can result in big savings as it reduces the projected interest payments by an amount nearly equal to the donation itself!!

Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray, President of the UUA, delivers a compelling message about what Unitarian Universalists are doing to create climate justice. The UUA and UUs advocate for climate justice following the leadership of most impacted communities doing frontline

climate justice work. *Create Climate Justice* is a community organizing hub for UU Climate Activists. *Create Climate Justice Net* was created to give UU climate and environmental justice activists and coalition partners a valuable tool for education, collaboration, and organizing. It is a joint initiative of the Unitarian Universalist Ministry for Earth, Unitarian Universalist Association Green Sanctuary Program, and UU-United Nations Office.
