

Message from Our Minister

As we begin our month of exploring what it means to be a people of **commitment**, my thoughts begin with the commitments we've made to each other as members and friends of this congregation and then move outward to the larger denomination of which we are a part. Here at UUC, we'll be kicking off our annual Stewardship Campaign mid-March. One way we renew our commitment to the congregation is by making a pledge of financial support. Considering what this community means to us and why we want to invest our time, energy, and money helps us renew that commitment. Making this process intentional—sitting down with family members to talk or taking time to reflect on our own—can deepen the experience of commitment, making it a spiritual practice as well as helping us determine just how generous we want to be in our pledges. I encourage us all to not make these decisions lightly but to recognize them as an important part of our spiritual and religious lives.



This month, we'll also invite people who have not yet become members of UUC to consider whether they believe that they have found a spiritual home and are ready to join. Becoming a member is usually a simple act—signing the membership book and making a pledge of record—but it signifies a deep commitment to be in covenant with each other. If you feel ready to join, please contact me and we'll figure out how and when you can sign the book. We'll celebrate new members during the Sunday service on March 21.

We have not had a new member recognition ceremony since last February, since we started meeting virtually for Sunday services. Which means we will be observing a somber anniversary this month—one year since we stopped being able to meet in person. While the end is in sight, brought closer by each person who gets vaccinated, it will be good to mark this anniversary. We are all invited to participate in a virtual service—*Lamentation, Gratitude, and Hope!*—on **March 12** at 7 PM with Unitarian Universalists across Virginia. This gathering of UUs was sparked by a conversation in the UU religious professionals group, with whom I meet monthly, about what it means for congregations to be in covenant with one another, to be committed to one another. As the pandemic has made abundantly clear, we are all connected. And our transition to virtual gatherings makes it possible for us to widen the circle of our UU community to include many other congregations. The question is, what kind of commitment do we want to make to our sibling congregations?

Speaking of the religious professionals group—formerly known as VACUUM (Virginia Cluster of UU Ministers)—we have recently renamed ourselves the **Joseph Jordan Cluster**. Our new name honors the first African-American to be ordained as a minister by the Universalist denomination and founded the First Universalist Church of Norfolk, VA. (Learn more about him here.) It also acknowledges a commitment to learning more about our past, so that we can create a better future.

In the month ahead, as we explore what it means to be people of commitment, take some time to consider your own commitment to this congregation and to Unitarian Universalism.

Message from Our Board Wayne Neu, President

First of all, I want to extend my hearty congratulations to Rev. Pam for being awarded **Full Ministerial Fellowship** by the UUA - roughly the equivalent of getting tenure as a minister. That status will be officially conferred during the <u>Service of the Living</u> Tradition at General Assembly this June. Previously Rev. Pam

had been granted Preliminary Fellowship which required an annual review and renewal process. She is now no longer subject to that annual review process. One further interesting possibility that goes along with this is that she can now mentor an apprentice minister who would serve our congregation. I look forward to the day when we can find the financial support to make that happen.

Speaking of financial support, the big task last month for the Finance Committee and Board was setting a budget for the next fiscal year in preparation for our annual Stewardship Campaign. In setting the budget, we had three major priorities. The first is giving our staff a much-deserved raise in salary. Last year, after the results of our Stewardship Campaign, we had to eliminate all cost-of-living raises from our budget. (In recognition of having earned her credentialing as a religious educator, Karen Hager got a small increment per UUA guidelines.) Of course, we all know how the advent of the COVID pandemic added so much work for them this past year. In next year's budget, we have included 3.5% cost-of-living raises for all staff in an effort to make up for the lack of raises last year in some small way. I sincerely hope that we will be able to raise the funding to make this possible!

The second major priority in our budget was putting away money for major expenses we know we'll have in the future. We have savings in two areas, the Building Maintenance Escrow Fund and the Minister's Sabbatical Fund. Our last major facility expenditure was during the building expansion (completed in 2008). Many things are now reaching the age where they will soon need replacement or repair. Among the major items that will need to be addressed are our heat pumps, the roof, and exterior painting. The heat pumps will cost \$30,000 or more to replace, a new roof will cost \$10,000-\$15,000 or so. I don't know what a paint job will cost or what other items will need replacing soon. The point is that these are all costs of our building ownership and will be a lot easier to swallow in annual installments than all at once when they hit. During Pam's next sabbatical, we will have to pay others to come in and substitute for her in her ministerial duties. Again, this year we had money in our budget for these items which had to be eliminated after our Stewardship Campaign. In next year's budget, we have added \$6000 for the Building Maintenance Escrow Fund and \$2500 for savings toward the sabbatical.

Finally, we recognize that, at some point in the not-too-distant future, we will be transitioning back to in-person services. We recognize that that transition will happen gradually, and we'll want to maintain our online presence for those who choose not to (or are unable to) attend in person. This will require an investment in **new equipment** to make both modes of delivery work together. The budget includes \$5000 for investment in equipment for that purpose.

We have limited our budget goals this year due to the financial realities facing many of our members during these times. Our stewardship goal is \$12,000 less than it was last year. However, our goal is still about 8% greater than pledges for this year. Considering that some of us may not be able to commit as much as last year, I am hoping that those who can will step up and "give until it feels good" to help fill in the gap. I do feel strongly that the additions to our budget are all very important.

In another important bit of Board business this month, we decided to put forward a proposal for changing our bylaws during our annual meeting this

Worship Beyond Walls: Connection, Community, and Service



Our 2021 pledge drive kicked off on February 14 with the *Early Bird* portion of the campaign. As of now, we have **46 pledges for a total of \$120,067** which is over 33% of our goal of \$345,000. Thank you to all who participated in the Early Bird effort so far! This portion of the pledge drive will continue until *March 14* when our more formal pledge activity begins. After the 14th, congregants who have not pledged will be contacted by a steward. Remember that these stewardship contacts are not just to solicit pledges but also to provide the opportunity for congregants to talk about UUC finances and to ask questions about congregational issues. It also provides a personal touch with a warm and friendly voice, which I believe most of us can use right now. I personally know how irritating unwanted solicitous phone calls are, and I think most of us have gotten into the habit of filtering our calls. But please be gracious in these uncertain times and realize that the unfamiliar number ringing on your phone might be your personal steward – one who specifically selected you. If you don't pick up, please consider returning the call.

To address the challenges accompanying our seemingly never-ending Covid plague, we're trying something new in an effort to expand our ability to engage congregants. In addition to the usual UUC media

outlets, phone, and email, we're adding text messaging in the hope of reaching those who do not answer their phone or read email. The Stewardship Committee is well aware that texting is not the most "engaging" format, but it is good for reminders and to perhaps initiate further contact.

We have been living through a frightening and uncertain period in both our personal world at home and the greater world beyond. This time has been challenging for everyone, including for those in our beloved congregation who must navigate the continued operation of UUC. In the next month, the Finance Committee and Board will again have to make hard choices about where and how we can trim our budget. We urge you to think of the value of this congregation particularly in these difficult times – for yourself and for others. As I think back on how our congregation has responded to this unprecedented Covid challenge, I am awestruck at how our leaders have rallied to not just weather this storm but have managed to bring a new sense of warmth and inclusion and purpose to our church. From online services; a very engaged RE program; novel, safe and distanced outdoor activities; remote choir contributions; and the many other UUC activities that have been modified for remote participation, I am amazed at how they have pulled it off!

To those of you who have pledged: Thank you! For those who haven't, we invite you to go ahead and make a pledge via our <u>online pledge form</u>, even if it is a smaller commitment than you've made in years past. No amount is too small. If the economy and your personal financial situation improves in the year ahead, you can always increase your giving. And if things turn out even worse than you expect, let us know that, too, and we'll find a way to help. All of our pledges, no matter their size, are a sign of our commitment and faith in this spiritual community and its ability to thrive, even in these most difficult times. We are grateful for them all.



The Fifth Dimension





- Discussion of the Commission on Institutional Change report – governance section. The Board began a discussion of the chapter on Governance from the UUA document, "<u>Widening the Circle</u>", by considering what structures and practices of UUC may hinder participation in governance by some.
- ◆ The Board approved Pam's nominees for serving on the Committee on Ministries, Jane Keppel-Benson and Ashley Spinks Dugan.
- The Board is working on a procedure for starting new groups at UUC.

The next Board meeting will be held via Zoom on Thursday, **March 11** at 7 PM. The <u>minutes and reports</u> of meetings for the past two calendar years are available.


