Signs of spring seem to come earlier each year. The little yellow flowers outside my office



routinely peek up through snow, but not this year. Despite some bitterly cold weather, we haven't had much snow this year . . . Yet, saying that probably means that a snowstorm is just around the corner. But isn't that the way? We get tastes of springtime in February and March, only to get a blast of winter after the vernal equinox. Which makes those early blossoms seem all the more brave. Despite the unpredictability of the seasons, the crocuses, snowdrops, and even the daffodils leave the security of the soil to become harbingers of spring – bringing welcome spots of color into otherwise dreary days. They make themselves vulnerable to the weather in order to grow. Their growth requires vulnerability. Come to think of it, so does ours.

Being vulnerable – open to harm – has traditionally been seen as a weakness, something to avoid at all costs. But more recently, researchers like Brene Brown have popularized the notion that choosing to be vulnerable can lead to living more authentic lives and forming deeper, more satisfying relationships. When we open up and let others know who we really are, with all our human imperfections, we can be seen and truly known, which takes courage. When we risk taking opportunities to learn and grow, we can live into who we most want to be. Which takes courage — both as individuals and as a congregation.

How might we choose vulnerability, authenticity, growth, and courage as a congregation? We'll spend March exploring this Path of Vulnerability, starting with the kick-off of our annual Stewardship Pledge Drive, honoring the risks the founders took almost seventy years ago, leaving us the legacy of a thriving congregation. We are all invited to consider what risks and commitments we're willing to make - financial, yes, but also with our participation – in this community. Sign up for one of the many stewardship events to be reminded how much UUC means to you AND to have fun. We'll also have our annual chili cook-off this month, along with the family movie night, for plenty of times to gather as a community. At the end of the month, the Committee on Ministries will introduce a process of giving and receiving ongoing feedback so that we can explore ways we want to learn



and grow, to become vulnerable and change.

In the month ahead, consider how you might choose vulnerability, authenticity, growth, and courage. When and where in your life could opening up – to people, to experiences, to yourself – lead to change and growth? Like those first flowers of spring, how might moving down the path of vulnerability lead to a more vibrant, colorful, and authentic life?



Message from Our Board



I am proud that the Board is also part of the buzz. One of my first board meetings four years ago, a member came to let us know that there was an issue with the accessible entrance. The issue was resolved the following week. The prompt action of the board has always impressed me. Last month it happened again. Members of the Environmental Rights and Justice Team came to request attention to the suggestions from the energy audit conducted last year. The auditors suggested three phases of work that could be completed at the UUC and save energy usage. The board was asked to support completion of phase 1, which was not specifically in the annual budget. The board approved funds for that work to be completed, and as we are working on the 23-24 projected budget, hope to include funds for phase 2. We count on you, as members

and friends, to let us know your needs and priorities so that we can respond appropriately.

The cost is \$10 per person and a maximum of \$20 per family. We will have music from seven decades for your dancing entertainment, and some goodies to reenergize. Anti-Racism Group is Continuing Our Discussion of the

1619 Project:

The Anti-Racism Group is discussing the award-winning book, The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story, edited by Nikole Hannah-Jones, Caitlin Roper, Ilena Silverman, and Jake Silverstein, which is about the inheritance of race and caste that defines America. We meet on the second and fourth Sunday of the month from 1:00 to 2:00 pm on Zoom.

We take one chapter at a time, so that we have a chance to read, think about, feel deeply, and discuss with one another this invaluable history lesson that resonates in all of our lives today. So far, we have read the chapters entitled (1) Democracy, (2) Race, (3) Sugar, (4) Fear, and (5) Dispossession. In March, we will read (6) Capitalism (**March 12**) and (7) Politics (**March 26**).

Learning about our nation's history from the perspective of racial oppression, resistance, and strength is equipping us with more informed ways of showing up for our nation's dialogues about race and caste. Our March conversations are co-facilitated by Katherine Allen and Annette Burr. All are welcome to attend! Please join us, even if you haven't had a chance to read the chapters. We are learning from each other.

Each section of the book contains a main essay (e.g., Dispossession), written by a renowned scholar, educator, or journalist. Then, each essay is followed by two literary works (e.g., poem, memoir, story) that brings a historic experience associated with the legacy of enslavement to life.

Stewardship: Creating Legacy

My first involvement with UUC Stewardship was years ago when Marilyn DuPont was chair of the Committee. I received a phone call from Frank DuPont asking if I would consider being a steward and I listened as he explained the role – reaching out to congregants, asking about their concerns, talking about UUC activities and aspirations, and lastly, asking for a pledge. I heard "asking for a pledge" and said to myself, "No way can I do that!" Then, after some hemming and hawing, I told Frank that, yes, I would be a steward because, well, you just can't say no to Frank.

At the end of the pledge drive, Marilyn asked for feedback from stewards on how it all went. I sent her a couple of thoughts based on my experience and she replied to say those were good comments and would I like to serve on the committee. I cringed and searched for any good reason why I would be a terrible committee member but in the end, I said yes, because you can't say no to Marilyn either.

As a raw recruit in my first committee meeting for the new pledge year, Linda Powers, the chair at the time, turned to the group and said, "The first thing to do is elect a new chair and it should be one of our new members." As one of only two new members, this statement set off all sorts of alarms. After a long staring match between Wayne Neu (the other new recruit) and me, I blinked and thus became Stewardship Chair. I was terrified, but it worked out okay because Linda and Joe Powers patiently shepherded me through everything. On a personal level, my involvement in stewardship grounded my own experiences at UUC and made me appreciate so many different aspects of the programs our stewardship supports – listening to my wife, Mary Ann, in the choir, watching my son, Finn, grow through RE, teaching in the OWL program, and feeling my mind settle during services.

In that long preamble, which feeds into the theme for this year, *Honoring and Creating Legacy*, I mentioned five members of the UUC who have helped build our legacy. And even though I never would have believed stewardship would become a key role for me at UUC, I like to think my work there is also a small part of the UUC legacy that we carry forward. Importantly, I came to realize that the annual Stewardship Campaign is existential; without a financial foundation we cease to exist. And by "we" I mean not only the bricks, mortar, and utilities, but the programs and all we do within our own walls, as well as in the community and beyond. This is how it has been since 1956 when the original seven families applied to the American Unitarian Association for a charter. And I have faith that it will be that way for many decades to come. Let's make sure our stewardship in 2023 becomes a part of our own legacy for the future.

The Official Stewardship Kickoff is **March 5**, but "Early Bird" pledging is open now and everyone should have received a Pledge Reminder postcard. Also, <u>read about</u> and <u>sign</u> <u>up</u> for one or more cool Stewardship Events. Later in the pledge drive, stewards will be contacting people who have yet to pledge at that point. As always, we are looking for stewards to help with the 2023 campaign. It's an important and rewarding experience and I promise we won't make you chairperson!


