Message from Our Minister Rev. Pam Philips

What does it mean to be a *People of Story*?

I am so grateful for the stories my older relatives have shared with me about what their lives were like *way back when*. I remember looking at old black and white photographs with my grandmother as she recalled stories about her adventures with her cousins and her brother. I especially loved hearing her stories about my father's antics when he was a little boy—who knew he was such a troublemaker! Whenever we visited our maternal grandparents, we loved watching Papa's old slides, which sparked memories and reminisces. Pretty soon, the stories we heard about *their* lives became our own.



In the months during my mother's final illness, she dictated stories of her life in response to questions asked on behalf of her grandchildren. Those stories, along with our father's versions of some of the same events, became a

cherished booklet compiled by my sister. She was motivated to ask those questions by hearing our mother's regrets--that she hadn't asked *her* mother questions. Whose stories do you most want to hear before it's too late?

As we begin a month-long consideration of what it means to be a *people of story*, one of the spiritual exercises in our Soul Matters packets invites us to ask someone a rich question and listen to the story it elicits. This being the time it is, the suggestion is to ask the question on Zoom (which makes it easy to record for later--definitely one of the advantages of connecting virtually). I am feeling motivated by that suggestion—to ask a question and listen to the story. Now all I have to do is figure out whom and what to ask. Whom and what will you ask?

But this being the time it is also has me thinking – what stories will we tell years from now about this time? When our children or grandchildren, grandnieces or nephews ask, "What was it like to live in the time of COVID?" How will we answer?

I think of the way people talk about this strange time, some bemoaning all the things, great and small, we are missing, while others focus on the silver linings. I am guessing we all tell both kinds of stories, depending on how we're feeling or what's happening on a particular day. And both stories are true. And both stories help shape how we are experiencing this time.

So, what stories are you telling yourself now about life in the time of COVID? Are they stories of quiet times of introspection or of active engagement in a changing world? Stories of isolation or connection? Stories of barriers or opportunities? Are they stories that are serving or stifling you? Are they the whole story?

In the month ahead, as we explore who we are as a people of story, we can ask ourselves these questions and more. And we might want to take time to write the story of NOW so that when we're asked, "What was it like to live in the time of COVID?", we have an answer in real-time. Imagine what it might be like to read your story in a year or five or ten!

In the month of May, we'll be writing a new narrative as a congregation. As the weather improves, we'll have more chances to gather—including a Monday Gathering on the Grounds. We'll have a child dedication during our service on Mother's Day (contact <u>me</u> if you'd like your child dedicated). We'll celebrate our youth as they make transitions in their lives. And we'll explore how and when we will gather more in the months ahead. And you are all a part of that story.

Message from Our Board

Well, it's budget time again, and the Board is struggling to make it work again. We don't like to talk about money much, but I'm a pragmatist so here goes. As I was thinking about this column, I remembered an old story. A priest was standing in front of his



flock one Sunday morning and said, "I have bad news, and I have good news, and I have more bad news. The bad news," he continued, "is the roof is leaking, the windows won't seal, and the furnace is held together with bailing wire and duct tape. The good news is that we have the money to fix all these things!" Then, after a pause, he says, "And the more bad news is that that money is in your pockets right now" as he passed the collection plates.

Well, I have good news, bad news, more good news, and a thoughtful discussion to share here. Get ready for your eyes to glaze over. The first good news is that, as I write this, our Stewardship Campaign has resulted in roughly \$320,000 in pledges for fiscal year (FY) 2021-22! That's about \$2000 more than pledged for this current FY which ends June 30, 2021. Many thanks are due to Andy Roberts and the rest of the Stewardship Committee for their hard work on the campaign.

The bad news is that our pledge goal of \$345,000 was based on an already austere budget. The Finance Committee and Executive Board held a joint meeting in late April to work on the budget for next FY. We predict additional, non-pledge income of about \$33,000 making our total income for the year \$353,000. Unfortunately, after cutting all we dare, our expenses total \$379,000. Of this, "fixed" expenses – payroll, mortgage, utilities, routine building maintenance, and other administrative costs total \$328,000 (this has actually increased from our pre-campaign estimate due to an increase in health care expenses). Other items we are loath to cut, including our Religious Education Program, our UUA dues, landscaping, mowing and snow removal, total \$29,000. We've budgeted only \$22,000 for everything else we want to do – and we've cut that down as much as we feel we can.

Now the other good news. For this year, we have money in savings to cover the projected \$26,000 shortfall. Projecting out our expenses and income for the rest of the year, I'm guessing we will end FY 2020-21 with a deficit of about \$5000. That is better than the \$8500 deficit that our FY 2021 budget projected. Due to the COVID craziness, our expenses have been much lower, but our pledge and half-plate income are also running a bit behind. On the plus side, we had our \$34,800 PPP loan forgiven, boosting our assets, and we've gained about \$9000 on our invested savings. That, I'm projecting, will leave us with unencumbered assets (assets not already earmarked for something else) of about \$82,000. (This does not include our small endowment account.)

The thoughtful discussion is how did we get here, and what do we need do in the future. I'd like to compare our current FY 2021-22 budget proposal to FY 2018-19, the last pre-COVID year. Our total payroll expenses have gone from \$192,000 to \$230,000. Raises have been small. We gave a 2.6% raise in FY 2019-20, eliminated raises last year and are proposing a 3% raise this year. The bigger changes have been annual retirement contributions for our Administrator and DLFD, increased health care costs, and a small bump for Karen Hager having earned her Religious Education Certification. The total "fixed" expenses I mentioned earlier have only gone up about \$28,000, however, because of savings from the refinancing of our mortgage and reduced cleaning expenses while we are not in the building. The "loath to cut" expenses have actually gone down by \$2,000, and we have cut our other

April Board Mtg. Highlights

- Patrick Feucht provided a synopsis of his
 Baseline Solar proposal to install solar panels on our roof. If approved, we'd have two options: 1) UUC pays the full cost and then owns the panels, or 2) Baseline Solar provides the panels at no cost to UUC, and we then pay Baseline Solar (instead of Apco) for our electricity use. Questions include insurance coverage and the impact of having a different percentage of usage offset (presentation was for 93%), size of array, and payback options. If one of these proposals is approved by the Board, it will be presented for a vote at the Annual Meeting on June 6.
- The building will remain closed another month, and the Safety Committee will be consulted for opening guidance and policies.
- The policy for starting new groups was approved. Read the policy <u>here</u>.
- A proposal requiring a bylaws change was put forth to allow people who are not physically available to sign the membership book in Blacksburg to submit a letter requesting membership.
- The Board agrees with the proposed 8th Principle (see page 9 for more info.)
- Ellen Plummer, Steven Henninger, and Bob Stimson were approved as GA delegates for 2021. We are entitled to two more delegates.

The next Board meeting will be held via Zoom on Thursday, **May 13** at 7 PM. The <u>minutes and</u> <u>reports</u> of meetings for the past two calendar years are available.

programs by about \$5,000 to help make ends meet. We have reinstated two savings lines in our FY 2021-22 budget that we eliminated last year, one for future expected repairs of our building (our last major investment was the 2008 expansion) and one to fund the extra expenses we will incur during our minister's sabbatical. These are an effort to earmark savings on an annual basis for known large expenditures we will face in the future, so we don't have to find that money all at once. They show up as an expense in the budget and total \$8,500. We also have a one-time investment in technology to allow us to transition to hybrid online and in-person services of \$5,000 in the FY 2021-22 budget. The bottom line is our total expenses from FY 2018-19 to FY 2021-22 have increased from \$344,000 to \$379,000, a \$35,000 increase. Over that time our pledge total has increased from \$311,000 to \$320,000, a \$9,000 increase. The total of our other income (including non-pledge donations, half-plate collections and the auction) has actually decreased by \$20,000 from what we had in FY 2018-19 to what we are projecting in FY 2021-22. If you are keeping score at home, that means that we have gone from a \$20,000 surplus in FY 2018-19 to a projected \$26,000 deficit in FY 2021-22.

So, while we have the savings to cover that deficit this year, we obviously cannot go on this way. Certainly, this is a trying time, financially and otherwise, for many of us but it has become far too easy to just pledge the same amount from one year to the next, and our income has not kept pace with our expenses over the last three years. In order to balance our budget and get back to funding our programs at a level similar to what we did in FY 2018-19, we will need to see an increase in annual pledge income of at least 10%. That's an average (and I hate to use averages) of almost \$200 per pledge unit. If we want to do more, we will need more than 10%. We obviously value what we get out of being members of our UUC because we have close to 170 "pledge units" who cared enough to donate. Let's commit to fully funding it! As our lives get back to whatever the new normal is going to be, we will need to commit to doing this if we are to retain the level of programs we have today. I have faith that we will.

In other exciting news, UUC member Patrick Feucht's company, Baseline Solar, has presented the Board with a proposal to put solar panels on our roof at no cost to us beyond a \$1000 connection fee. He and his partners would set up a separate entity which would own the panels and sell the power they generate to us at a cost similar to what we currently pay our electric company (Apco). While this would not save us money on our power (unless the electric company raises their rates), we would be living our values by buying our energy from a renewable source. We are still working out the details of that proposal but if acceptable to the Board, we will bring it up for a vote of the congregation at the Annual Meeting.

Adopting the 8th Principle

As you know, our Anti-racism Group has been studying the <u>8th principle</u>, and we are bringing it to the congregation for a vote at the Annual Meeting on June 6. The 8th principle reads, "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

Virtual General Assembly (GA) 2021

GA is the annual meeting of our Unitarian Universalist Assoc. (UUA). Participants worship, witness, learn, connect, and make policy for the Association through democratic process.

This year's theme: *Circle* '*Round*

for Justice • Healing • Courage. GA Justice • Healing • Courage is a time to circle 'round in community. We circle 'round in care and healing; for liberation and justice; and for love and courage.
