Welcome Winter!

It was 17 degrees this morning when I woke up, which tells me that no matter what the calendar or sky says, it is winter. The nights are longer, the days are shorter, and the weather is colder. Winter is not my favorite season – I favor the new growth of spring and the spectacular colors of autumn – but I've come to value winter in ways I never did when I was younger.

Winter can be a time of rest and reflection, coming in from the cold and curling up with a hot mug and a warm blanket. I used to call winter my "Persephone phase" – after the Greek goddess who spent winter down in the underworld – because I became a bit of a hermit during the winter. But especially as the holiday season approaches, with so many opportunities for socializing and service, we can also get pulled into a whirl of activity. The darkness is punctuated with colorful lights and decorations and the stillness with familiar holiday tunes.

As I anticipate the months ahead, I'm mindful that we can choose which side of winter we most want and need in our lives – coziness and calm or fun and frolicking.

On the fun and frolic side, we'll kick off December with a Holiday Fun Night on Saturday, December 2nd – with cocoa, cookies, crafts, and Christmas classics. And we can all get involved in this year's multigenerational, no-rehearsal play on Sunday, December 17th – this year with an interactive retelling of the nativity story. These are in addition to our many Food & Fellowship and Lifestage groups that meet weekly or monthly.

On the cozy and calm side, we'll have Sunday services exploring the Gift of Mystery in our lives, including the day-to-day moments of wonder and those special holy times. With Christmas Eve on a Sunday this year, we'll dedicate the morning service to the mysteries of the Solstice and the evening service to Christmas. We'll also have our usual meditation and conversation groups.

I am especially aware of the importance of making intentional choices about what we need and want in our lives given my recent (and first!) bout of COVID. My usual inclination to power through and do all the things, even when I'm not feeling 100%, was no match for my COVID symptoms and the realization that I needed rest and isolation to get myself well and to keep from spreading the virus. I'm grateful that I had the ability to stay home, watch Netflix, and call on others for help, to do the things that I couldn't do. I was sad to miss out celebrating Thanksgiving with friends but grateful for the turkey soup dropped off on my doorstep. I come away from COVID with a reminder that I shouldn't have to be sick to get the rest I need, to ask for the help I need, and to accept others' generosity. So my invitation to us all is to be intentional in the months ahead, assessing our own needs and our ability to help others, giving ourselves the gifts of quiet AND celebration.

Message From Stewardship

Stewardship Basics

The annual UUCNRV stewardship campaign, which begins in March, is right around the corner, so what better time to go over the basics of stewardship?

One of the comments stewards often hear is, "I contribute to the basket, so why do I need to pledge?" Just as your personal household monthly budget cannot be left to the whims of occasional donations, the budget of the UUC cannot be met by the money placed in the basket each week. We all know the many benefits we receive from our UUC community -- religious education for our children and adults, a supportive spiritual community, beautiful music, fun community events, opportunities to participate in social justice programs and community outreach — to name a few. These programs are supported by the time and energy of our many, many volunteers, but also by significant individual financial commitments, which we accept as our responsibility when we become a member of the UUC.

Last year's goal to support all of the workings of our congregation was \$376,000. The largest proportion of the budget is devoted to paying the mortgage and the salaries of our paid employees. In order to support new initiatives, we often need to increase the goal. Past initiatives have helped to support a ministerial intern position, energy-efficient improvements to our building, and newly created action teams and groups, such as the UU Young Adults.

Although the Finance Committee has not yet determined the goal for 2024-25, we can expect it to be at least as high as it was last year. We can easily divide the total budget by the number of congregants to figure out how much each person or "pledge unit" would need to contribute to meet the budget, but we know that not everyone has the same level of financial resources from which to draw. In the end, the amount you contribute is not as important as the fact that you make a regular contribution that can be counted on to pay the bills. What we can afford to include in the budget will be determined by the pledges everyone makes.

Each year the Stewardship Committee decides on a theme for the campaign and how the campaign will be run. Some of the details are yet to be decided, but this year the committee has decided to do away with the "Early Bird Campaign", which was typically done in February for those who wished to pledge early. This year's campaign will run through the month of March and will include a Kickoff Stewardship Brunch where everyone will have a chance to contribute feedback about their experience at the UUC, learn more about stewardship, and submit a pledge. I encourage you to think about what you value about the UUC and what you would be willing to pledge for 2024 over the next few months. Let's continue to support our beloved UUC congregation!



Anti-Racism

The Anti-Racism Group will meet again on **December 10** to discuss the award-winning book, *The 1619 Project: A New Origin Story*, edited by Nikole Hannah-Jones, Caitlin Roper, Ilena Silverman, and Jake Silverstein, which is about the inheritance of race, caste, enslavement, privilege, and hierarchy that defines America. We meet on Zoom from 1:00 to 2:00 pm. Join here.

On December 10, we will discuss two brief chapters: Chapter 15, on the topic of Healthcare, and Chapter 16, on the topic of Traffic. Given the holiday schedule, we are meeting only once in December, and we finish up discussion of the book in January.

Reading the chapters in the 1619 Project by award-winning authors has shed new light on our nation's history about racial oppression, resistance, and strength in ways that none of us learned in our own educational experiences. It has also helped us to show up for local and national dialogues and activism regarding race and caste in more informed ways. Our conversations are co-facilitated by Katherine Allen and Annette Burr. All are welcome to attend! We hope you can join us on December 10 (even if you haven't had a chance to read the chapters). We are learning from each other and the scholars, educators, and journalists who have authored the chapters and accompanying literary works.



Social Justice at UUC

Social Justice is alive and well at UUC through the activities of our 4 social justice teams: Anti-Racism, Environmental Justice/Climate Change, Reproductive Justice and Voting Rights. If you are interested in any of these social justice areas, we invite you to join us. We welcome your ideas, suggestions, energy, and involvement as we learn and act together.

Reproductive Justice – Since this team formed in Jan. 2023, we have been educating ourselves about reproductive justice issues which cover the gamut. We follow the Sister Song definition of reproductive justice which is "the human right to maintain personal bodily autonomy, have children, not have children and parent the children we have in safe and sustainable communities."

In 2024 we will continue to track relevant legislation in the VA General Assembly and support bills favorable to reproductive freedom. Two bills, one in the House and one in the Senate, which have already been filed, will start the process of amending the VA constitution to ensure the right to reproductive freedom. Passage of these bills could potentially put reproductive freedom on the ballot in Virginia in 2026. Also, in 2024 our UUC team will be focusing on maternal and infant health. We will be tracking and supporting legislation that promotes improved maternal and infant health and will be working with local and state partners in this effort.

We welcome you to join us whether it's for a one- time activity or ongoing involvement. We meet via zoom. Contact <u>Sara</u> for more information.

Voting Rights - The Voting Rights Team was formed in Jan. 2023. Most of our energy in 2023 was directed toward providing voter information/education to our congregation and to the community specifically focusing on the 2023 General Assembly election and local elections.

In 2024 we will track legislation in the VA General Assembly and support legislation favorable to voting rights. One such piece of legislation is a bill, already filed for both the Senate and House, for a constitutional amendment that will guarantee automatic restoration of voting rights to individuals who have completed their sentences for felonies. According to the ACLU, Virginia is one of only two states that ban a person convicted of a felony from voting for the rest of their life unless granted a pardon by the governor. A proposed amendment to the VA constitution must pass the legislature two years in a row with an election in between which means it would be 2026 before this issue could go on the ballot for voters as a referendum.

If you sometimes think your vote doesn't matter, look at some of the recent local and state election results for our area and you will see how very important every vote is! Unfortunately, attempts at voter suppression/restriction are continuing throughout the US in many state legislatures as well as via some court rulings. The right to vote is the cornerstone of our democracy. And, as we all know, 2024 is a presidential election year.

If voting rights are important for you, we encourage you to join us and UUs all across the country in taking action to support voting rights. Our meetings are via zoom and all are welcome. Contact <u>Sara</u> for information.

Getting Your Ducks in a Row



Ministry Discernment Update: Gratitude and Next Steps

Around 40 people showed up to participate in the listening circles in October, and a cornucopia of ideas were shared to help us as we begin our journey of discerning an outward-facing ministry the UUC might undertake in the future. The Ministry Discernment Team (MD team: Niko Rensberger, Lucas Machi, Ally DeHoff, Jim Kern, and Alex Parkhurst) has since been hard at work, reviewing all the input and data that were shared, not to mention so many one-on-one conversations, email exchanges, etc.

In addition to all the ideas (thank you thank you!), we asked participants to name their fears and concerns about taking on such a ministry, as well as what they perceive to be the UUC's gifts and sources of abundance, and we were amazed by the wisdom and celebration that arose out of this sharing. Among the concerns, an oft-repeated question was whether we have the capacity to take on this kind of ministry as a congregation, and also people had concerns about inadvertently doing harm, or not being able to follow through, or sustainability. At the same time, participants expressed so much love for our faith tradition, a desire to live and promote our values within the larger community, and a great appreciation for our buildings and grounds and, most especially, for our connections to one another.

Lucas Machi has created a <u>network visualization</u> with the data - you can interact with it to better understand the complex connections within all the ideas shared - and we also have a video summarizing the data, both linked from the <u>MD team Web page</u> (in the Members Area of the UUC Web site). For those wanting a quick overview, check out the Listening Circle Results Summary PDF. Please take some time to explore and look through all that was shared, and then we will be asking for everyone to participate in a short <u>questionnaire</u> to help us discover: *of the ideas shared*, which topics/areas speak most to you? Where do you have connections in these communities/areas? Answering these questions does not mean committing yourself to anything (although if you want to be involved in the process, do let us know!) so we encourage you to take the time to review the data and offer your input *by December 10*.

After December 10, the MD team will review all the feedback received from the questionnaire, and we will pick two or three areas to explore. We will begin contacting people in the identified communities/areas, and start the work of building relationships and learning what might be needed or wanted. From this, we will develop ideas for two or three possible ministries to present to the congregation, who will then have the opportunity to discuss and to decide: 1) whether the UUC wants to take on a collective, outward-facing ministry at this time, and if yes, 2) which proposed idea would they like to pursue.
